




Gary informed the reunion was one of the most meaningful and most moving experience ever for him. Being able to reconnect with old friends and classmates after 40 plus years!

CIRCE OLSON WOESSNER: Writer focuses on military families

As a full-time federal employee and military wife, mother and daughter, I had more than enough on my plate when, in 2011, I came up with the idea to start a museum dedicated to military families — to all generations and branches. The idea came to me without warning. At that time, my son was deployed to Iraq, and as I watched the evening news Middle East footage, I hoped he was doing OK and would come back to us safe and sound. It occurred to me that around the world, mothers and fathers, husbands and wives, children and friends, were worrying about their loved ones serving in harm's way and we all had this in common.

Generations upon generations of military families have experienced the warring emotions of love, pride and fear during their service member's career — many of them masking their inner terror by outwardly putting on a brave façade — all the while keeping the "home fires burning." It dawned on me there must be a museum, somewhere, dedicated to military families … So like everyone living in the 21st

century, I Googled it. I couldn't find anything! There are military museums with a wing or exhibit highlighting the family, but I didn't see anything as inclusive as I envisioned. Right then, I called my then-82-year-old father. "Dad," I said, "we are going to start a museum!" Now, the "Museum of the American Military Family" is a reality, located atop Bataan Military Academy Charter School in Albuquerque.

The museum has a special collections library with several hundred books, videos, DVDs and CDs created by military family members. It has hundreds of folios of first-hand accounts of military family life dating back to World War II. MAMF has had three major exhibits: "Sacrifice & Service: the American Military Family," hosted at the National Museum of Nuclear Science and History and seen by 17,600 visitors from Memorial Day through Labor Day 2014; "Schooling with Uncle Sam," in the Albuquerque Special Collections Library last July and August; and our mini exhibit "Perspectives," currently at the University of New Mexico Veterans Resource Center. We have hosted dozens of film and spoken-word programs throughout the greater Albuquerque Metro Area. As an Army wife and mother and an "overseas brat," my whole life has been influenced by the military. I was born in France on Evreux Air Base and lived in Germany until age 18. My husband and I were stationed on seven posts and bases in the states and overseas before settling in Albuquerque. Our oldest son went to boot camp at Fort Jackson, South Carolina, where he'd lived in second and third grade. Our youngest son can't visit the home on Kirtland Air Force Base where he lived during middle school. Our house on Stockton Loop was torn down years ago. The college where my husband and I met, the University of Maryland in Munich, Germany, has been closed for decades. This "rootlessness" is another aspect of military family life that gives us our cultural identity and common bonds.





With Rich History And Tax Breaks, Berlin Lures American Filmmakers

Berlin is a favorite with many top American filmmakers and actors, and chances are you've seen landmarks from the German capital in movies — even when you didn't expect it. Take The Hunger Games: Mockingjay — Part 2. The film's fictional capital, Panem, was partly filmed at Tempelhof. This one-time airport was the focal point of a humanitarian airlift in 1948 and 1949 that helped break the Soviet blockade of West Berlin.

One of the German capital's biggest Hollywood fans is Tom Hanks. He first came to Berlin four years ago when filming Cloud Atlas, and has been back many times since. "I have been in the deserts of Morocco, I've been on the islands of Fiji, I've been in Moscow, London, Paris, Florence. I've been in some very glamorous world capitals," he tells NPR. "But the affection I have for Berlin is much deeper than anywhere else." Hanks, who lived in Berlin last year during the filming of *Bridge of Spies*, says he's fascinated by the city's complex history, especially its frontline status during the Cold War between the Soviet Bloc and the West. "The Cold War aspect of Berlin is something I grew up with," he says. "It was in the news, it was part of our social studies." But Berliners themselves are also appealing, Hanks says. There's "the most fabulous conversation to be had in your average coffee house or hotel lobby or cinema at 2 o'clock in the morning, as you are lining up to see an old movie that everyone else in the neighborhood is showing up to see as well."



Tom Hanks, whose dramatic thriller Bridge of Spies was partially filmed at Berlin's now-defunct Tempelhof airport, is one of the German city's biggest fans from Hollywood. "The affection I have for Berlin is much deeper than anywhere else," he tells NPR.

Such enthusiasm for Berlin, and Germany in general, from Hollywood A-listers is something the government has tried to nurture since 2008, says Die Welt newspaper's veteran film critic Hanns-Georg Rodek.

"The German culture minister said we must get big productions in order that German filmmakers can learn their craft, actually," he says. "So you can get a percentage of your film's budget [from the government] if you do it in Germany." And American film and TV companies keep coming. Besides Bridge of Spies and the latest Hunger Games, the current season of the Showtime series Homeland recently wrapped up production in Berlin. A new spy series for American TV by Epix called Berlin Station is shooting at Studio Babelsberg now. The 103-year-old studio, which features Nazi-era architecture and sprawls over 40 acres on the outskirts of Berlin, is legendary among cinema buffs. Studio spokesman Eike Wolf says the concept for the V for Vendetta mask was created here, as was the countdown eventually used by NASA to launch spaceships. The countdown first appeared in the 1929 German movie Woman in the Moon, Wolf says.

The studio grounds are chock-full of bits and pieces of Hollywood and TV productions, like the V for Vendetta mask and a Styrofoam recreation of part of the Berlin Wall. Studio Babelsberg "is the full-service company for these film projects," Wolf says. "We do location scouting, get all permissions. We take care of film funding, accounting, all the insurances. We set up the crew, we do set construction with our art department, so a film producer can get everything."

But film critic Rodek says neither the studio nor the German government should rest on their laurels if they want to keep attracting American moviemakers. "The problems for Berlin are not the technical capabilities, but the working costs," he says.

Filming in Eastern Europe, for example, is far cheaper than in Germany. And Great Britain subsidizes a quarter of the costs of movie productions shot there, which is a lot more than the roughly \$11 million maximum per film provided to American productions filmed in Germany, Rodek says.

Hanks has another suggestion: "If you want to attract the big motion pictures to your local film industry, the best thing you could do is probably build five or six very large, state-of-the-art sound stages that motion pictures can move into for their duration."
Wolf says he agrees in theory, but that in reality, it's a costly proposition the studio can't afford without more big movie projects. Nor does Wolf believe sound stages can lure filmmakers away from the generous tax incentives and other funding provided in other countries.

He says the studio is among those lobbying the German government to become more competitive.

"If we want to set up a really good film industry here in Germany," Wolf says, "these subsidies must be so attractive that the American films are coming to Germany."




seen riding a bicycle between his apartment on Hauptstraße in Schöneberg and Hansa Tonstudio, the recording studio he used, located on Köthener Straße in Kreuzberg, near the Berlin Wall. While working with Brian Eno and sharing an apartment with Iggy Pop, he began to focus on minimalist, ambient music for the first of three albums, co-produced with Tony Visconti, that became known as his Berlin Trilogy.

Dec 18, 2015 Berlin Church Hopes "Star Wars" Awakens Service-Goers

Where else but in Berlin? A Christian congregation in the capital city has found a way to use the excitement surrounding the release of the new "Star Wars" movie to bring people through the doors of the sanctuary. The Lutheran congregation, Evangelische Kirchengemeinde Am Weinberg, will hold a "Star Wars" service on Sunday, December 20, the final Advent Sunday, in the Zionskirche (Zions Church) in Berlin Mitte.



Why, you ask. Well, according to a church announcement, organizers have found parallels to Biblical messages in the film. In a decisive scene in "Star Wars Episode VI – Return of the Jedi," (1983) the Emperor tries to compel Luke Skywalker to forsake his Jedi oath and join the "Dark Side." But, explains, theologian and Star Wars expert Lucas Ludewig, Skywalker resists with the words, "Never. I'll never turn to the Dark Side." Ludewig and his colleague, Ulrike Garve, both pastors in training, came up with the idea for the service after talking about the Biblical messages they saw in the series. Skywalker's declaration, for example, parallels with Romans 12:21: "Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good."

"We wanted to illustrate these analogies to those who come to the service," Garve said in the announcement from the Lutheran church district for Mitte. The service was interspersed with film scenes, as well as organ music inspired by "Star Wars" music. Service attendees who came in costume or brought accessories were able to take part in a drawing for tickets to the latest film, "Star Wars: The Force Awakens."

The Zionskirche was an important meeting place for opposition groups in East Berlin. During the 1930s, Lutheran pastor and Nazi-resistor Dietrich Bonhoeffer worked here.

Do you remember where Germany was divided?

On the 25th anniversary of reunification we drove 5000 kilometers from east to west and north to south, right across Germany. 25 years of unity, 25 locations - each tells something else about the country and people.
