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School Spirit:



Ann, through her very fine character, positive leadership, effective and varied contributions to wholesome student life, and good scholarship, has won the privilege of wearing this pin. The PTA honor pin will be awarded at the end of each grading period to the student in grades 7-12 who makes the most effective progress in the points named above, The winner is named by the faculty,

Ann is the third TAR School student to win the PTA honor pin. Two previous awards were made at the end of 1950-51 school term to Louise Tandy, daughter of Lt. Col. F.G. Tandy, and to Mary Louise Moore, daughter of Major

S. A. Moore.

These three students and future winners of the PTA Outstanding Progress Pin are entitled to wear the pin so long as they maintain the high standards upon which the award is made.

The Honor Room banner, another award donated by the PTA, was given to the first grade room on the basis of the best conduct in homerrom , corridors, lundroom, playground; at tractiveness of room; and cooperative spirit in class and other group activities. The honor room (grades 1-6) will be named each month for the remainder of the year, rather than at the end of the grading period.

To be placed on the high school Honor Roll at the end of a marking period, a student must have earned an average of at least 3.5 honor points in his basic subjects (English, math, social studies, science, language, typthe averages, computing ing). 
Teacher of the Month.
