The Berlin American High School chorus joined with the Frankfurt High School chorus, who call themselves the "Meloteens."


This ensemble presentation began sixth period, November 19, with Frankfurt leading things off.

But don't thing you're taking me for a ride." And I asked, "Okay, now what's for me,





It has come to my attention that despite the fact that there are trash cans in every hall for our use, people continually misuse them.


These trash cans were designed for trash, not to contain bodies or as basketball hoops. I would like to thank everyone who has been considerate enough to appreciate public property.

In Germany, the holiday season starts on December 5, when the children watch for the good Saint Nicholas. On the evening of the 5th, the children pelish their pest shoes and set them out on the door step. If the child has been bad the past year, he will find switches in his shoes. If the child has been good, his shoes will be filled with small presents, candy and fruit. Quite often they find a little of both in their shoes.

The next occasion in December is December 24th, Christmas Eve. The German family eats Christmas dinner and waits for the Christkind(Christ Child) to come and bring them presents. After supper they all listen for the tinkling of a little bell announcing that the tree is decorated and the presents are under the tree. Before the gifts are opened, the family sings Stille Nacht (Silent Night) and other favorite carols.

Another Christmas tradition is the Adventskranz (Advent's Wreath). It is a wreath made of pine branches holding four candles. Every Sunday in December the family gathers around the wreath and one candle is lit, the final candle to be burned on the last Sunday.


Along with the Adventskranz there is the tradition of the Advent Calendar. This is the first present given to a child in the holiday season. It is a calendar of the month of December up to Christmas Eve. It has a picture on the front with small doors worked into the design. There is a door for every day. BEAR-A-CUDAS STROKE AUGSBURG

The Berlin Bear-a-cudas hosted the Augsburg Otters in a European Forces Swim League swim meet recently at Andrews Pool. There were several outstanding swims as the Bear-a-cudas won the meet, 279-115.

The Bear-a-cudas took 33 of the 48 events in the meet, 10 of which wer: 1-2-3 sweeps. In another 10, the Bear-a-cudas finished 1-2 and also won seven out of the eight re-

lay .

Four Berlin swimmers had three wing apiece. Colleen Pierce won the 10-and-under 100-meter individual medley, 50-meter backstroke, and 50-meter butterfly. Katharine Keough, had wins in the 11-12 50meter freestyle, 100-meter individual medley and 50-meter butterfly. For the second time in three tries, Katherines times in each event were all within one second of the EFSL records. Veronique Alderson won the 15-18 girls' 100-meter free-100-meter freestyle, 200-meter individual medley, and 100-meter butterfly. Veronique's times in the freestyle and butterfly races were also within a few ticks of the EFSL records. Sherrell continued to be unbeaten this year by winning the 15-18 100meter freestyle, 200-meter individual medley, and 100-meter butterfly. Like his teammates, Skip also had near-record times in the freestyle and individual medley. He holds the EFSL freestyle record and missed the individual medley record by three one-hundredths of a second.

Berlin's 15-18 relay quartet of Skip Sherrell, Katherine Keough, Veronique Alderson and Mitch Mosler finished just four-tenths of a second away from a new EFSL record.

The brothers Wugofski of Berlin, Ted and Tim, each placed first in the 100-meter breaststroke, and third in the 100-meter freestyle. Timm did it in the 13-14 age group, and Ted in the 15-18 age group.

BASKETBALL CLINIC HELD AT SPORTS CENTER

On November 28 and 29, a basket-ball clinic was held for all boys interested in playing basketball. On November 28, the clinic was held for sophmores and freshmen, in which sixteen boys participated.
