Three weeks ago, the B.A.H.S. track team went to Bonn to compete in a triangular meet with Osterholz and Bonn. The Berlin women's team compiled 35 points and took third place in the meet. The men's team won 27% points and they also took third place. The women's team collected five first places, two thirds, and two fourths. The men's team won four first places, two thirds, and two fourths.

Christy Schliefer lod the women's team, winning three first place borths. Christy won the ECM-meter race in 2:34.0, the 1500 in 5:20.0, and in the 3.000 in 11:52.2.

Trisha Lindsey won two firsts, one second, and one third. Trisha placed first in the high jump, jumping 4:4. Trisha placed first in the 100-meter hurdles with a time of 16.57. She also placed second in the long jump, with a jump of 13'11" and third in the 100-meter dash, with a time of 14.2 seconds.

Tena Steiner won a first place berth in the grueling 400 meters. Her time was 66.2 seconds.

The women's sprint medley team made up of Tena Steiner, Debbie Stowell, Patrina Smith, and Mina Buenviaje; placed third in the meet with a time of 5:23. The women's 1600-meter team took second place, with a time of 5:12.0.

Cletis Smith shined in monts action, winning three firsts and a second. Cletis won the long jump, jumping 19'7". He won the triple jump with a jump of 39'10". In the sprints, Cletis won first place in the 200 meters, with a time of 23:9 seconds.

Brian Frazier won one second and one third place berths. Brian took thrid in the 400-meters, with a time of 54.7 seconds. Brian took second in the long jump, jumping 18.6".
