

These distinctions should be highly reconized by our school; for both Mike and Clifford have made a great achievement for theirselves, their school, and the youth of to-


STRAIGHT A PARTY GIVEN



The teachers will study and discuss the list, and indicate students with poor grades and behavior problems. The final decision will be made by parents and the teachers.


The first payment of one hundred DM will be paid on November 21,1980 for the fifty selected students.


