


#### On Foggy Nights

## BIG SUCCESS

On the weekend of October 17, the Berlin Bears football teams played their Homecoming games against the Bitburg Barons. The result was a successful game for both the Varsity and J.V. teams.

The Berlin J.V. team got off to a slow start making their first touchdown in the third quarter and coming back to win the game with another touchdown in the fourth quarter.

Scoring in the game started with a one yard touchdown run in the second quarter by the Barons. point after failed. Berlin matched the score with an 18 yard touchdown pass to Delano Adams in the third quarter. The J.V. Bears put the icing on the cake in the fourth quarter when Adams scored again. Defensively, the Bears were led by William Pollard with nine tackles. The aggressive J.V. Bears again posted the right numbers on the scoreboard: Bears-12, Barons-6.

The Varsity Bears followed the winning ways of the J.V. team by outdistancing the Barons 25-23.

The Bears got on the scoreboard first in the second quarter on a 51 yard pass from Matt Dover to John Cervantes. Brian Frazier kicked the point after to make the score seven to zip. Bitburg retaliated on a 1 yard touchdown run. The point after was good to tie the score at 7 all.

It was at this point that Brian Frazier began to warm up. He slapped Bitburg with a 39 yard touchdown run and point after to make the score 14-7. He then grabbed a Baron pass and scored on the 45 yard interception run. Matt Dover added two with a point after run. The scoreboard now read 22-7 in favor of the Bears.

The Barons tried to catch the Bears in the fourth quarter on a 10 yard touchdown run and two point conversion but Frazier, on one of his best days, took the wind out of Bitburg's sails with a 25 yard field goal. In a futile effort, Bitburg put 8 more points on the board with a touchdown pass and two point conversion, but it was not enough to overtake the Bears, who planned a victorious Homecoming.

Brian Frazier, Mark Millen, John Cervantes, and Lawrence Remick made key interceptions to spark the Bear defense. Shutting down the Barons on the line, was the outstanding defensive trio of Aaron Owens, Frank Richartz, and Dan Corder with a combined total of 25 tackles. The final score read 25-23 in favor of the Homecoming Bears.

During the weekend of October 3, the Berlin Bears went up against the Hanau Panthers. Both teams failed to score during the first quarter. Brian Frazier put the Bears ahead with a 1 yard run in the second quarter. In the third quarter Hanau tied the score with a touchdown. Both teams scored in the fourth quarter, but Hanau's 2 point conversion led them to victory. Due to insufficient information, the J.V. game could not be reported.
