GRAND REUNION 1993

This past August several Berlin Brats participated along with 1,800 other former overseas school alumni in The Grand Reunion. The Reunion was held at the Hyatt Regency on DFW Airport in Dallas the first week of August. Over forty schools participated.

The reunion was the brain-child of Bill Gunkel of Reunions Unlimited. Working through the Overseas Brats organization, he contacted high school groups with the idea over two years ago. At first there were only eight or so schools who wanted to participate. As the interest in the idea grew, overseas alumni began pouring in from everywhere. Bill Gunkel conscientiously oversaw every aspect of the reunion, in order that each school group would have the most satisfactory reunion possible. (cont. page 3)

NEWS FROM RETURNEES

Over the past few months, several alumni have had the privilege of going back to Berlin to touring the old "home" grounds. They have called with updates, from time to time, about how the base has changed. I thought you might want an update yourself. Those I have heard from are: Mike Friedrick, Janeen Fisher-Ethier, Scott Ethier, and Greg and Myrna Orbock. Their travels date from the fall of 1992 until July of 1993.

As early as the fall of 1992, the base was being "spruced" up to be handed back to the Germans. Sundgauer edition was given back to the Germans to house the refugees from East Germany. In subsequent months, Duppel has been partially taken over by the Germans.

As for the changes on the base not related to the closing, the base is now guarded and closed, and guards are posted at the high school. The BX facility is now a mall-like structure, housing various shops.

The Harnack House, scheduled to be turned over to the Germans, was used this past year for the Class of 1993 prom. The Wansee Clubhouse is still maintained through the summer to facilitate the sunbathers and other summer sun worshippers.

The high school now boasts out-buildings including an art/shop building, a media center, and an ROTC building. However many additions the classes made throughout the years have been taken down in anticipation of the changes.

The duty train is now a high-speed ICE train making the journey from Berlin to Frankfurt in four hours!

The change in Berlin itself with reunification has been dramatic. The Ubahn now travels through East Berlin...now just Berlin. Visitors to the Brandenberg Tor are able to walk through the gate to the "other side". Check Point Charlie was taken down and removed to the Smithsonian Museum in D.C. Memorials to those who sacrificed their lives in attempts to cross over to the West, have been updated. The German government plans to re-use official buildings with modifications. So, the city we knew as children, will still be there with some modifications.

The base will officially close by January 1995. The school will be officially handed over to the Germans on June 30, 1994. It was announced that consideration will be given to families whose children are attending school, to allow them as much time as possible to complete their school year.

After our buffet meeting, we adjourned to the hospitality suite where we held a toast in honor of our time in Berlin with (what else) Berliner Weisse! (Thanks to the Orbocks, class of 1976.) We held a drawing for door prizes, and looked through the yearbooks on display.



The evening began with a recognition of each school group. Berlin was well represented by: James Timmerman, recognized for his years of service in the DoDDs system's schools; Barbara Hathcock-Mooney, recognized as the

oldest alumni; and Harry Graff, recognized as having traveled the farthest to get there.

Not recognized, but notable, were: Ms. Mary Recucki, retired after more than 20 years with BAHS; Ross Calvert, (class of '65) coach/teacher for SHAPE high school Belgium; Mr. Echeveste coach/teacher in the late sixties; Cathy Van Galder-Poethke, faculty 1979-85; Marianna Lieurance-Mounsey, class of 1950 (attended 1946); and Jean Crews-Derry, class of 1948 (attended 1946).

Saturday evening/Sunday morning the hospitality suite was open all night. The suite stayed full for the most part with alumni who weren't able to make the dance, but who gathered to get reacquainted. True to our history, we all had a party!

Reunion 1993 will be remembered as a first of many reunions of its kind.

Brief History of Thomas A. Roberts/ Berlin American High School

The school was begun in 1946 in a refurbished German girls school. There were fewer than 50 students enrolled in the entire high school. None graduated that year. Student activities consisted mainly of skating on the tennis courts in winter and playing tennis in the summer. The school football team was a 6-man squad. Jean Crews-Derry ('48) laughingly commented that she was made a cheerleader because she had a pair of oxfords. Sometime between 1946 and the mid-1950's, the school met in the old hospital building.

Thomas A. Roberts was built in the mid-50's and initially housed first grade through twelfth. The first principal decided the school colors should be maroon and white in honor of his college Alma Mater, Harvard. The AYA building was constructed across the street from the high school, next to the bowling alley, and students attended activities there in addition to school activities. The last graduating class from TAR was the class of 1965. At that time TAR became the elementary school and Berlin American High School housed the seventh through twelfth grades.

Berlin American High School rose from the Grunewald just beyond the graveyard and a few blocks from the AYA. The first class to graduate from the new Berlin American High School was the class of 1966. The three story-building was officially dedicated in 1968. That year a school flag was commissioned and one of the students, Diane Green designed the flag.

Additions to the school were made throughout the subsequent years. A new cafeteria was added, the most recent addition was a media center. Since the announcement on July 28th that the military was leaving Berlin, the school enrollment has dwindled. However, priority is being given to families of high school dependents to allow them to stay to finish the remainder of their senior year in Berlin. The last class to graduate from Berlin will be the class of 1994. The buildings will be turned over to the German government on June 30, 1994.
