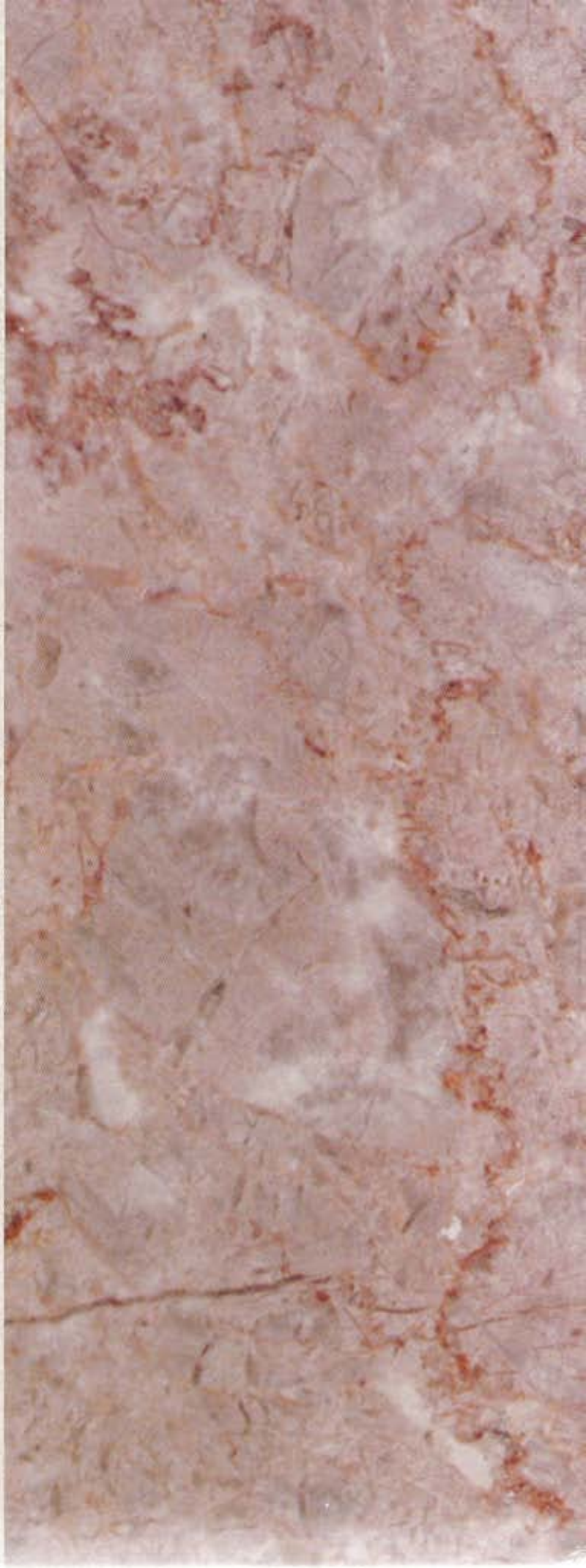

Recognition for BAHS Achievers

Grades are important, but after months and years of making the grade a student could lose track of what it's all about. Renaissance tried to remedy that problem with incentives and recognition for all those students who were doing well or working hard to improve. The Berlin military community, and BAHS staff and students established a set of standards to achieve. Each level had its own rewards, the least of which was recognition for effort. The important idea was that no matter where a student started, they could always do better.

The levels of achievement and recognition were:

Gold: all A's or all A's and 1 B - 4.0 GPA

Maroon: 3.0 GPA

White: Improvement of half a letter grade.

Students were also expected to have no 3rd tardy, no truancy, and no D's or F's.

How far Renaissance will go is up to the students. Hopefully, this is just the beginning for a new tradition.

A

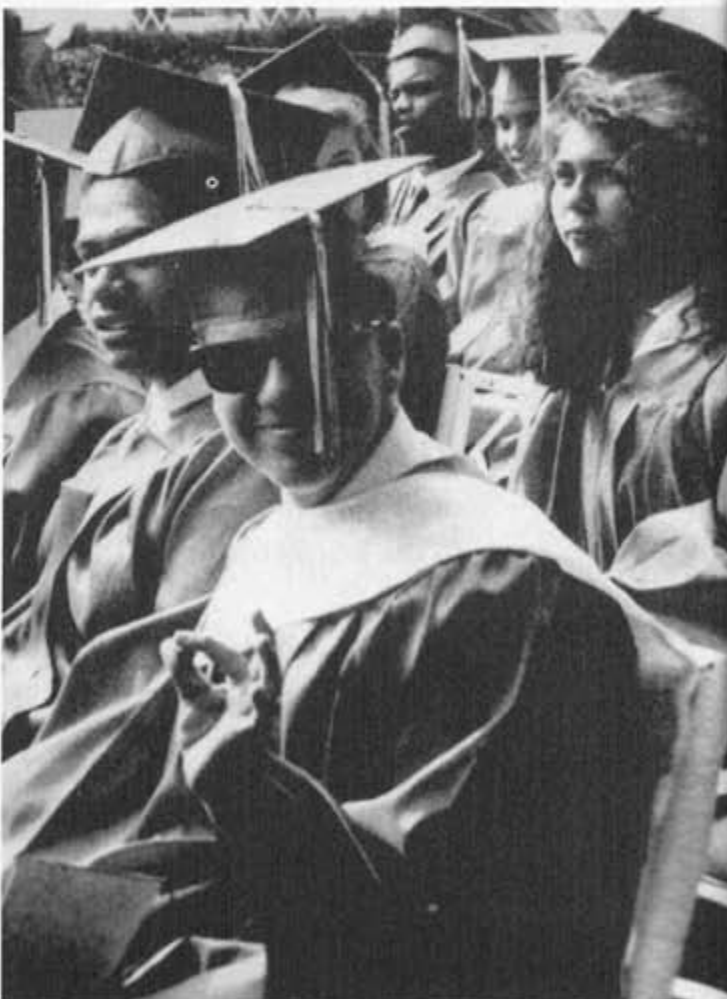

ast year SOPA was held at Osterholz High School from February 27 though March 2nd. BAHS students spent the three days in hours of rehearsals in preparation for the concert which was held on March 2nd.

The Symposium of Performing Arts was started twelve years ago by four similarly sized school to give outstanding band and choir members an opportunity to perform with other outstanding musicians. Students audition by sight reading and playing a piece of new music. Their scores are sent to the host school to be judged and selected. Once they are selected, students prepare seven to eight pieces prior to their departure to SOPA.

In addition to SOPA, music students participated in Honors Band and Choir. It is a festival sponsored by the DoDDS Germany regional office. Students must compete with many other talented students from schools all over Germany to participate in the festival.

Choir students have to sing a vocalize demonstrating their range of voice and then sing their part of a song while band students play their contrasting pieces and two scales. All of this is recorded and sent to the host school after many hours of rehearsals.

In the spring of 1991, Honors was held in Bad Kissingen in the Regentbau, a famous performance hall, which was built by King Ludwig II of Bavaria. Berlin American High School is only a 1A school but we made up ten percent of the band and choir by sending thirteen students.

Boy's Soccer- Kicking for a Strong Finish

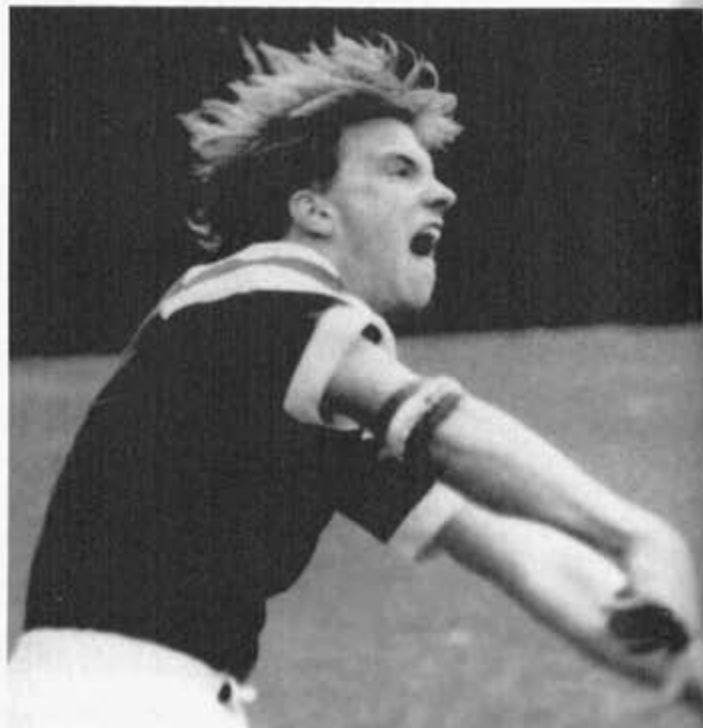
The boy's soccer team ended their season on a very strong note exhibiting the most powerful offense in the conference.

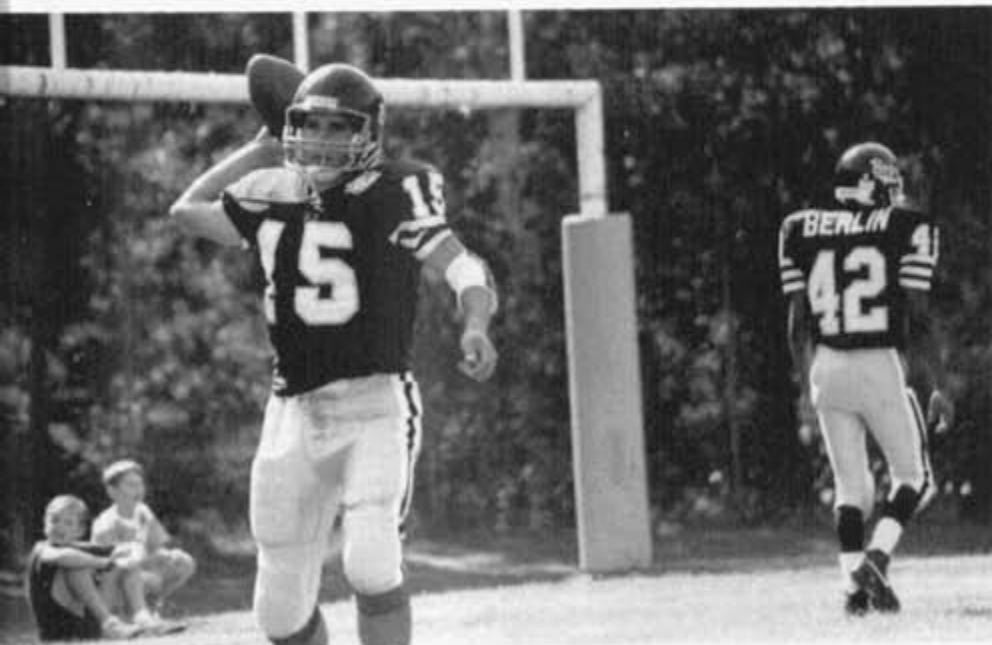
The team was kept going by Coach Wayne's motto,

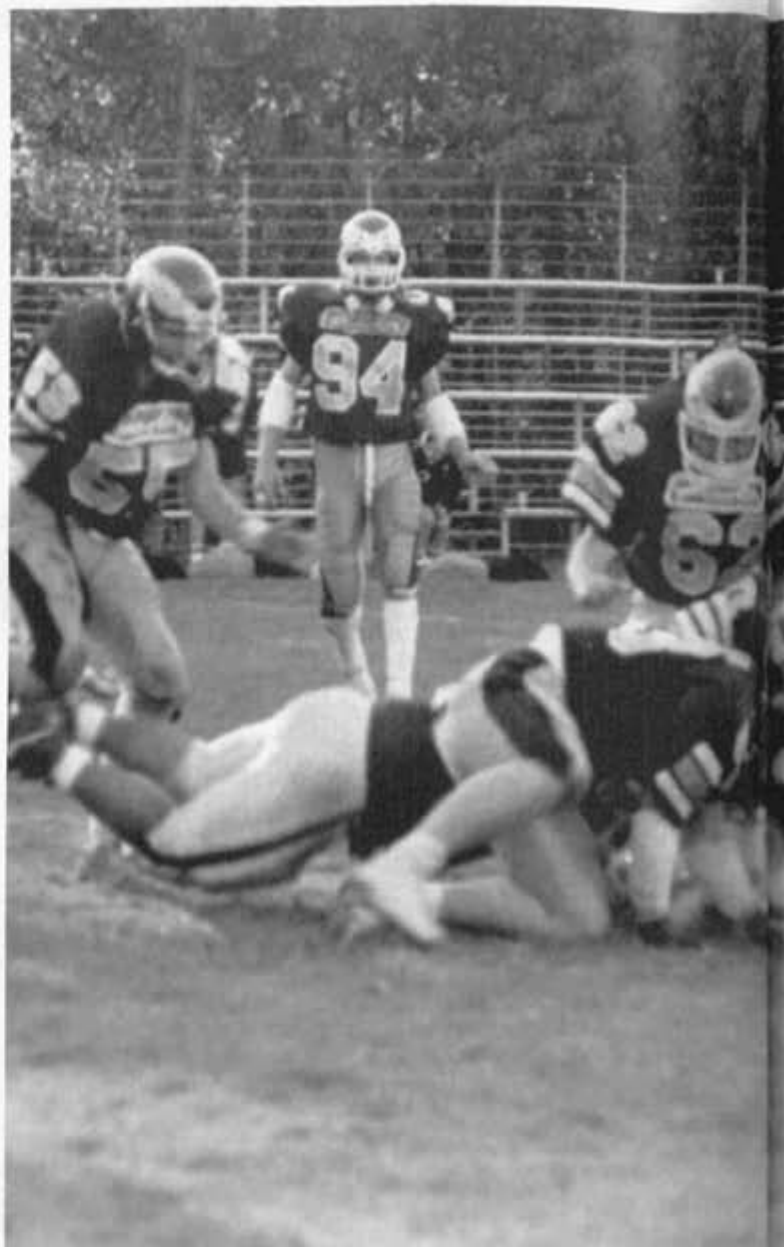

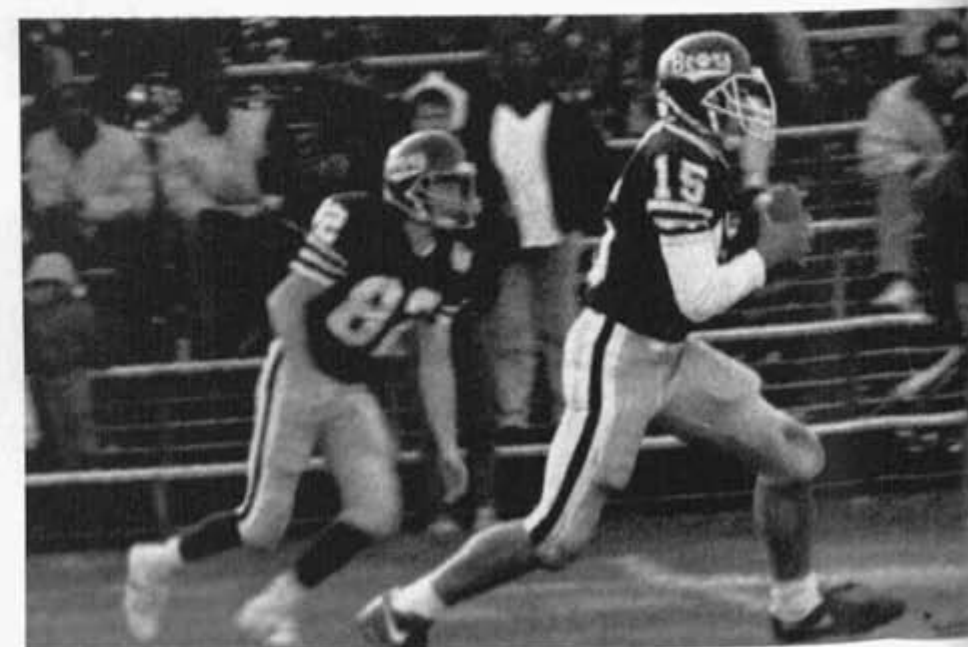
While the BAHS men battled outdoors on the gridiron, the BAHS women battled on the volleyball court.

Christmas? CHRISTMAS! BAH Humbug!

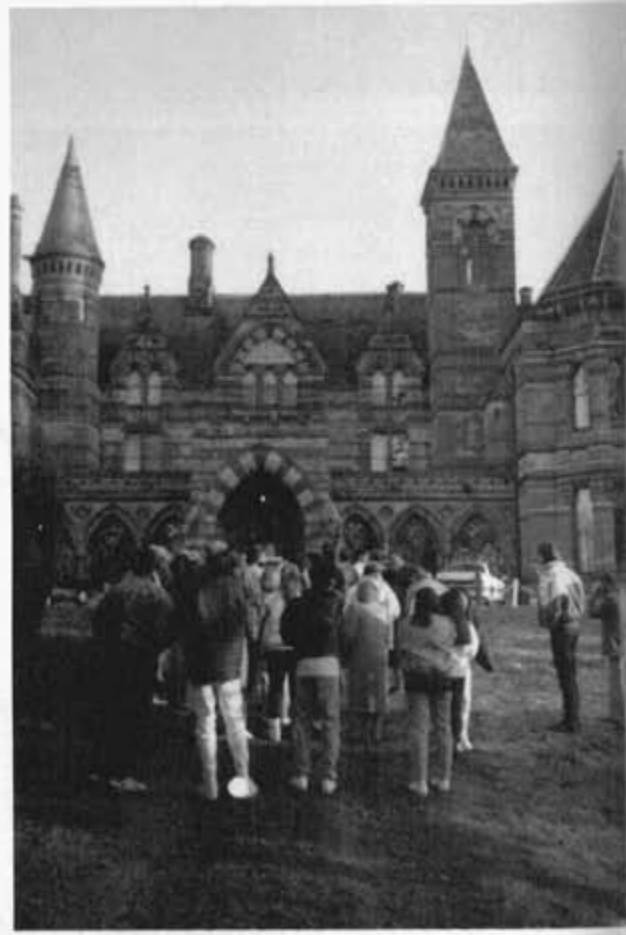

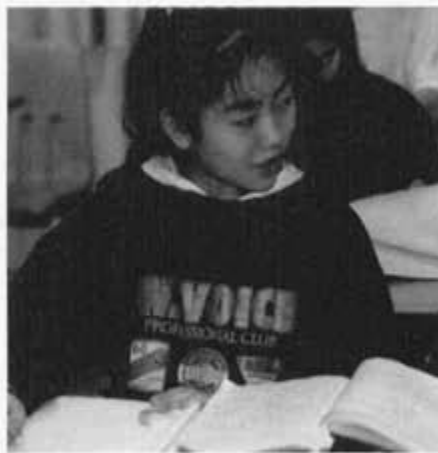


Accepting the Challenge

The team finished the regular season with a 7-7 record. Kali Robinson was leading

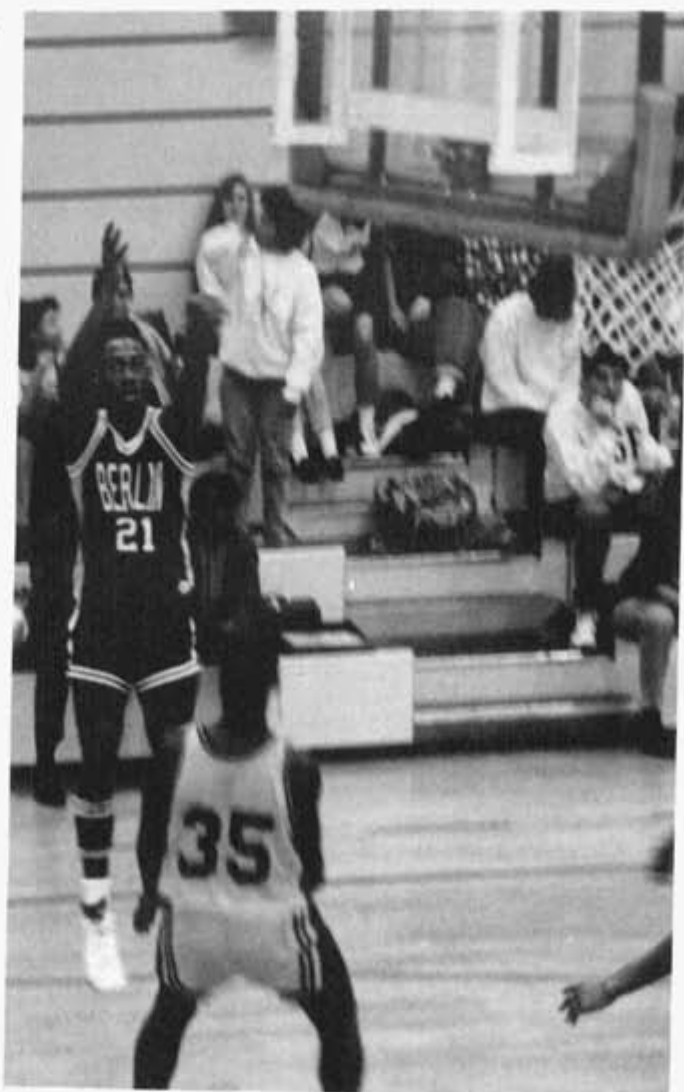

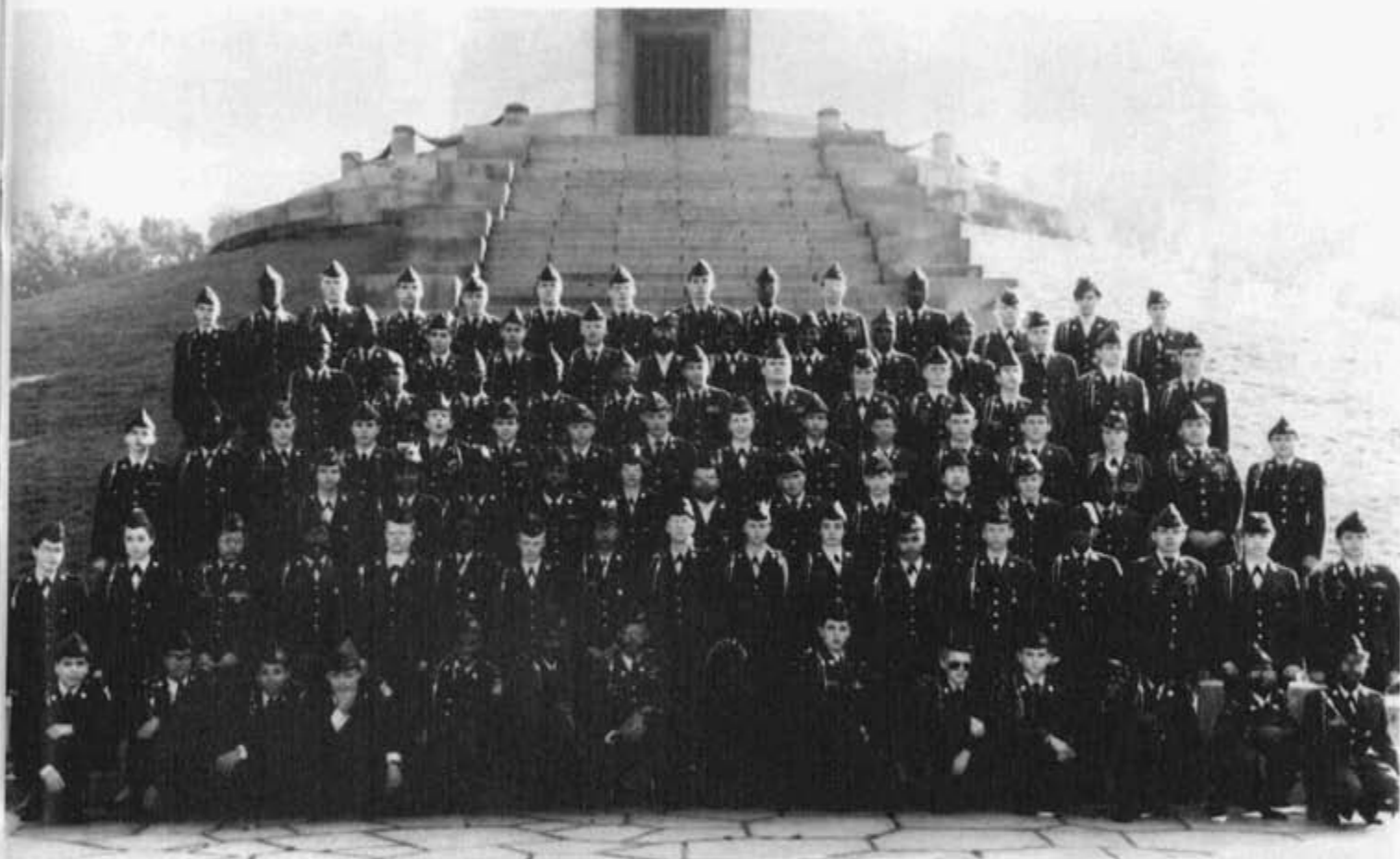
