

WAS NO SURPRISE that the Special Troops Battalion of USAREUR-Seventh Army Troops — better known as the Heidelberg Celtics — easily walked away with the honors in the USAREUR battalion-level basketball championships at Berlin last week.

Even those observers who might not have gotten the word from this column were convinced after the first day of action in the Sports Center gymnasium. The Celtics took the floor for the sixth and last game of the day and soundly thrashed the 3rd Admin Co — which won the company-level tournament at Wuerzburg and was a surprise last-minute entry at Berlin as the 3rd Div representative.

It was apparent then, after having seen most of the other teams play earlier, that the Celtics would prevail. With this settled, the

interest revolved around which team would get to challenge them in the final game, and this turned into a real donnybrook.

THE 14TH S&S BN of Seventh Army Support Command, after they fell back into the losers bracket with an 86-76 loss to the Spartans from 1st Bn, 36th Inf, of 3rd Armd Div, did not appear to be the team that would make it. True they had whipped the Berlin entry on Monday and the SETAF five on Tuesday, but it was the opinion of most people present that, if the 2nd Bn, 13th Inf, 40 Rounds of 3th Div didn't get them on Thursday, the Spartans would

But the 14th wouldn't say die. They survived a morning game against the Iron Horsemen of the 4th Bn, 35th Armor, out of 4th Armd Diy on Thursday and then came back strong that night to

take the 40 Rounds by 12 pounts.

Friday morning's return match between the 14th and the Spartans was easily the most exciting game of the tournament. Playing without Charles Rudd — probably the outstanding individual performer in the meet — for the most of the first half, and with a badly hampered Rudd in the second half, the S&S crew just out-hustled the taller Spartans to the overtime win.

Hostile Crowd

THE CROWD - with the exception of a half a dozen people from Heidelberg — was unanimously with them for the final game but the outcome was not doubted by many. After all they had played three tough games in the preceeding 36 hours while the Celtics hadn't been on the floor for almost 48. And then there was Rudd limping badly with a big bandage on his injured leg.

That the Celtics showed no mercy in the final game is understandable. They had brought the best team to the tournament, had won their previous three games easily and with the plentiful use of their not too potent bench. Yet every time they took the floor they were greeted with resounding disapproval by all the fans that happened to be in the Sports Center at the time. It was a case of "now we'll show you what we really can do." IF THE HEAVILY LOADED Kaiserslautern squad that arrived in Berlin the Sunday before the tournament to represent Com Z had been allowed to compete things might not have been so simple for the Celtics. I only had a quick glimpse at the roster but I recognized enough names to know it was a team that would have, at least, given the Heidelbergers a hard time.

But before the teams even met at 2 p.m. Sunday it had been determined that the team was ineligible as a battalion-level entry. It appears that the method used to combine several mits into one battalion-size unit of not over 1,100 men was note one prescribed in the regulations.

This was probably a simple misinterpretation of the directive. Anaps future directives can be a little more specific to make such misinterpretations unlikely. At any rate, it was a shame that the ballplayers — who surely weren't to blame for the foul up — should have made the trip ready to play and then have to go back home without touching a ball.

THERE WERE PLENTY of individual standouts in the tourney. T've mentioned Rudd, and surely John Shannon of the Celtics deserves recognition as does Rudd's teammate Bob Williams, Sam Key of the Spartans, J. C. Bingham of the 40 Rounds, and Bill Griffin of the Iron Horsemen, who tallied 41 points against Bingham's team for a tourney one-game high.

But the player that caught my eye was the Iron Horsemen's big, young center, John Thornton. Thornton averaged just over 30 points a game for the five contests his team appeared in and pulled down an average of just under 20 rebounds. Both

figures were high for the tournament, but it is Thornton's potential more than his performance in Berlin that impressed me.

John has just turned 20 years of age, is somewhere between 6-foot-6 and 6-7 and apparently still growing. His only basketball experience before coming into the service was high school ball

in his native Atlanta. He expects to return to Atlanta after Service and play for one of the small colleges in that city.

Though his lack of experience is obvious, it is his natural moves that impress. He has none of the awkwardness usually associated with a big growing boy. His coordination and grace of movement are extraordinary for a youngster his size. A little real fine coaching and a maturing of his mental attitude could make him a great basketball player.
