Costs of running BAHS top all time high in 80

Now that energy conservation has become such an important issue, the administration wishes to inform the community of the cost of running Berlin American High School.

The electricity bill per day is 200DM, and per year it is 1200DM. 176,000DM. Heating costs for a day at BAHS amount to 2500DM. Per year, the cost is 222,000DM. Custodial costs amount to 2800DM per day, and 416,000DM per year. Keeping the grounds and minor repair work comes to 2000DM per day. This comes to a total of 240,000DM per year. Major construction costs 3600DM a day and 43,200DM per year. The total cost of running Berlin American High School comes to a total of 1,097,200DM for the year of 1980.

Teens Adopt First Graders





Varsity wrestlers who were victorious included John Leal in the 98 1b. weight class pinning his opponent in 45 seconds. Tom Graham pin-ned his man in 5:45 in the 132 lb. weight class. In the 145 lb. weight class, Mike Short dominated his match with an easy 12-0 decision. Dan Short, who normally wrestles 155, wrestled in the 185 lb. weight class and gained the fastest pin of the meet in 28 seconds. Unfortun-ately the team was defeated by a very close score of 33-29.

January 24 the wrestling team was once again on the road. This time in Baumholder, not only taking on the Bucs, but also the Ansbach Cougars. Once again John Leal was victorious as he defeated his opponent from Baumholder in 1:51. Mike Short pinned his man from Ansbach in 2:32, and Dan Short won his match with a 9-5 decision over his Ansbach opponent. This time the scores were not so close as Berlin lost to both Baumholder and Ansbach by scores of 6-60 and 21-42 respec-

tively.

Berlin held its first home meet on January 31, hosting three very tough schools, Hanau, Stuttgart, and Kaiserslautern. Stuttgart handed over two forfeits, one being to Larry Speer in the 105 lb. weight class and the other to Jim Triplett in the heavyweight class. Other successful wrestlers included Mike Short as he defeated his man from Hanau by a decision of 13-7, and Dan Short, who pinned his K-Town opponent in 5:17 and also won a 9-5 decision over his rival from Hanau. Tom Graham was the big winner as he tied in his first match against K-Town with a score of 5-5, pinning his Hanau opponent in 3:41, and with an easy decision of 10-1 over his man from Stuttgart. Once again Berlin was unsuccesful as they were defeated by Stuttgart (23-48), Hanau (12-54), and Kaiserslautern (8-62).


