#### THE ANCIENT TALE OF HALLOWS EVE

Our present day celebration of Halloween is a mixture of different customs from all the people that have taken part in them.

The first people to celebrate on October 31 were the Celts of Scotland and Ireland. They believed that the God of the Dead, Samhain, would come to earth on the eve of the Celtic New Year, November 1, and collect the spirits of all the years dead for the long trip to the Underworld. Celebrations included bright fires and loud noises to keep the living safe while the dead travelled to Hell.

After the Celts became Christains, November 1 became All Saints' Day, or All Hallows Day. The night before, All Hallows' Eve, was a time to pray for the dead. From All Hallows' Eve comes the modern word Halloween.

The Scottish were in the habit of carving turnips in gruesome shapes with candles inside to scare off any ghosts. Immigrants brought this custom to America, where pumpkins were exchanged for turnips. This was the start of the American jack o' lantern.

The Irish believed that the "little people", or leprechauns, would come out on All Hallows' Eve and play tricks on the unwary. This led to the custom of trick or treats, when the sons of 19th century irish immigrants would remember the Old World customs by playing tricks on non-irish neighbors. This custom soon spread to everyone, and tricks were only played if treats weren't provided.


The implications of using public profanity are numerous and far-reaching. As obscene or suggestive words become more common, their usefulness is diminished. The increasting number of times profanity is encountered also illustrates the growing lack of education that is prevalent in today's society. Most tragically, ever-increasing foul word usage reflects the growing impoliteness towards other individuals.
