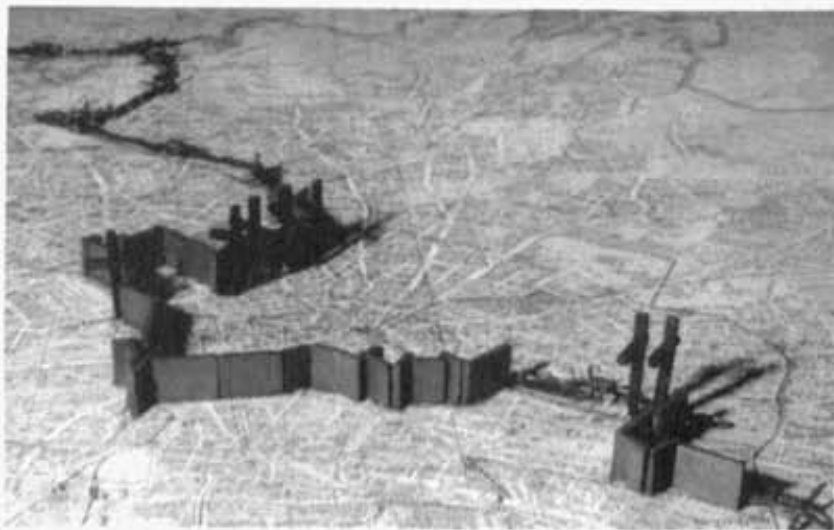
INTRODUCTION

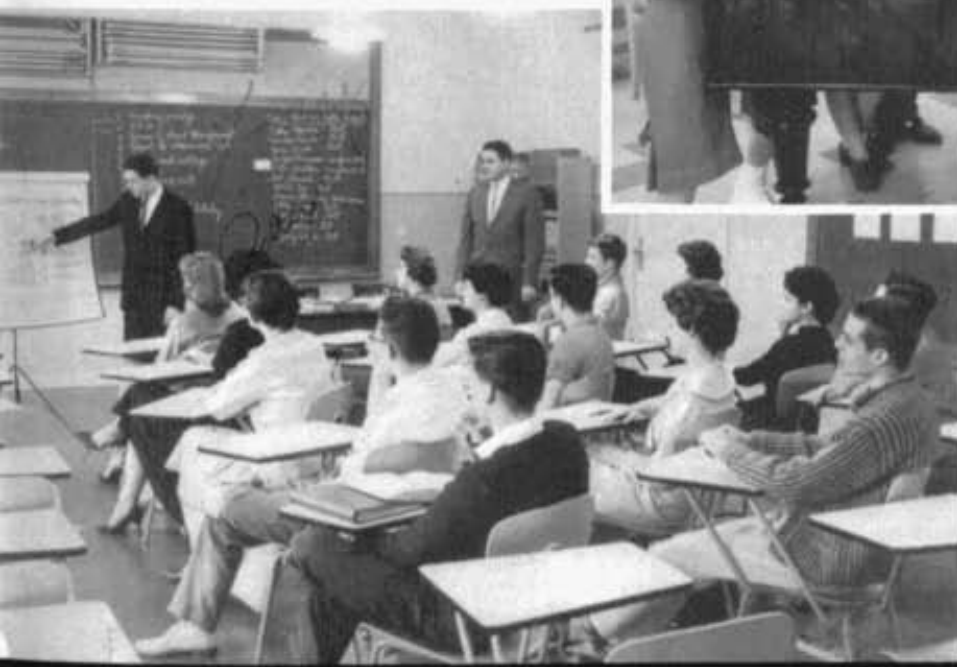

This can be accounted for by many reasons-the most important of which was looking forward to Bremerhaven and forgetting the Knights.

At last came the final meeting with Bremerhaven. We lost 13-2, but we went down fighting with a 3-3 record for second place in the Class C League.
