## Fifty-one Graduates Receive Diplomas at TAR

Fifty-one Class of 1965 graduates received their diplomas at the 18th commencement ceremony of the Thomas A. Roberts High School Tuesday evening. The commencement address was given by Major General Joe S. Lawrie, Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel and Administration, United States Army, Europe. It was the largest graduating class at the TAR School.

Two additional students were also graduates of the 1965 class but had left Berlin prior to the graduation ceremony.

Burton H. Cooper, the TAR School principal, introduced General Lawrie

to the gathering and thanked him for coming from Heidelberg to speak at the commencement.

General Lawrie told the class that learning is important because it gives us experience through which we learn to modify our motivations and that only through learning do we transcend all the standards we are set to meet. He pointed out that we perceive only what our breadth of experience allows and learning is a very necessary part of this experience. He said that people are our most important external surrounding and the individual

helps build those who build him. Through learning we widen our experience and are thus better equipped to deal with people.

General Lawrie concluded his address to the 51 graduates by stressing that as long as we sustain and maintain a belief in people and in the morals and standards of democracy we are better off than those across the wall, and learning is an integral factor in developing and maintaining this belief.

The salutatorian address of the graduating class of the Thomas A. Roberts High School was delivered

by Howard Michael Herron, the second highest student scholastically, and the valedictorian address by Susan Kay Fedyshyn, the highest student scholastically. Brigadier General John H. Hay, commanding general, Berlin Brigade, presented the diplomas.

The invocation and benediction were given by Air Force Chaplain (Capt) P. C. Brown, Jr. The High School Band, under the direction of Robert L. Ward, played the processional and recessional, and the High School Chorus, also under Mr. Ward's direction, sang The Lord's Prayer.

The Tuesday evening commencement ceremony marked the last graduating class from the TAR School. When the 1965-1966 school year begins, the High School will move to the new Berlin American High School facility.

ing address, the group ate lunch in the Headquarters Company—Company A consolidated mess hall, where they were hosted by Captain Robert C. Nargassans, the commanding officer of Company A.

After lunch the tour of McNair began with a visit to the Company C billets. The CO of the company, Captain Donald Almy, explained to the visitors the organization of the company and what the company commander has at his disposal to help him in accomplishing the company's mission. The group was given a tour of the Company C supply and arms room. In addition they visited one of the squad bays where the soldiers are billeted.

The West Berlin civilians were

then escorted to the football field where they witnessed a demonstration by the Vanguard Battalion's 4.2 inch heavy mortar platoon, who were using the pneumatic device that uses compressed air to propel a small sub-caliber projectile.

Next on the agenda was a look at all of the weapons that are organic to an infantry battalion. A display was set up for this purpose and a man familiar with each weapon, plus an interpreter, were provided to answer any questions that the visiting group had.

### 4-Ring Demonstration

After the weapons display the visiting group was treated to a ride in armored personnel carriers which carried them to the 4-Ring. There, Company A of the 1st Battalion,

34th Infantry, Berlin Brigade's current augmentation battalion, put on a demonstration of company formations, tactics and also a display of all the equipment used by a company when in the field or involved in actual combat. Also included in the demonstration were tanks from Company F, 40th Armor, and a forward observer team from Battery C, 94th Artillery, as well as engineers and their related equipment.

Upon the completion of the demonstration the visiting group departed McNair Barracks. The day-long tour was just another way in which the members of the United States Army, Berlin, strive to increase understanding between the West Berliners and the American soldier.
