Sports travel ends for BAHS

As of Monday, January 6, 1975, all sports and interscholastic activities have been deferred at Berlin American High School for an indefinite period of time. This ruling, from USAREUR, affects not only Berlin but the entire military school system in Europe.

An offical news release from Heidelberg stated that: "Those portions of the USDESEA sports program that involve TDY and travel have been temporarily deferred pending clarification of the TDY funding restrictions from the Department of the Army."

The cancellation was due to a lack of funds. TDY was eliminated for the coaches several weeks ago.

There are hopes at BAHS that this new regulation will be changed in the near future. Mr. Paul Britton, principal at BAHS, stated that many attempts to change this policy have been made on the local level. This situation is especially bad for the students at BAHS because interscholastic activities offered a change in scenery. Students located in West Germany are able to travel more freely than those stationed in Berlin.

The present interscholastic teams at BAHS will continue to practice pending the outcome of the situation.
